From the Commnader Cdr Sally Stuart, SN

“Oh, the weather outside is frightful...let it snow, let it snow, let it snow”. Many of us senior members remember Dean Martin singing that song years ago. It’s been snowing in my neighborhood and as I write this article, the snow has been piling up. There was close to 12” of snow in my backyard and it still continued to snow. Fortunately, there was no wind and I still had power.

We are about two-thirds of the way through Winter so we are likely to have more “frightful” days ahead of us before Spring arrives. Spring will arrive in the Northern Hemisphere on Saturday,

March 20th at 2:37 A.M. The Spring Equinox or Vernal Equinox occurs when the Sun is exactly above the Equator, at that time day and night are of equal length. After March 20th, the Northern Hemisphere begins to tilt more towards the Sun and results in longer daylight hours and warmer temperatures.

Until Spring arrives, I suggest you pick out a book, settle down in a comfy chair, and read. I recommend Patrick Dillon’s book “Lost at Sea”. Dillon describes the dangers of commercial crab fishing in the Bering Sea and the political battle to get safety regulations implemented.

Thirty-eight years ago, on the morning of February 3, 1983, fourteen men from Anacortes left their home port for a three-month fishing season in the Bering Sea. The fourteen crewmen were fathers, sons, brothers, and friends who had known each other all their lives. Their boats, the Americus and Altair, were reported to be two of the most high-tech crabbing vessels of the time. Each ship was equipped with thousands of dollars’ worth of lifesaving equipment and they were supposedly super-stable. Their company had a reputation as being a safety conscious outfit. Neither ship nor the 14 crew members returned to their home port.

Eleven days later after leaving Anacortes, on February 14th, the overturned hull of the Americus was found

drifting in the vicinity of the Pribilof Islands. The seas were reported to be calm. There was no record of a single distress call or trace of its crew. The Altair vanished altogether. A desperate search followed, but no evidence of the vessel or its crew was ever found.

Patrick Dillon uses his journalism skills to reconstruct the lives of the fishermen and their families and the dangers that commercial fishermen face. Dillon begins with the fishing company in Anacortes, it’s development and the personalities involved, and the loss of the fishermen who died at sea. He traces the two-year investigation launched by the Coast Guard and National Transportation Safety Board. Dillon describes the families’ efforts to get legislation passed to ensure greater safety requirements for fishing vessels over the vested interests of politicians, lawyers, and insurance companies. Dillon makes the case for the necessary regulation that was finally passed and has reduced fatalities.

Now is also a good time to brush up on the Navigating Rules, before boating season begins and you get back out on the water. The Rules are available on America’s Boating Channel, free. You can view the videos at <https://americasboatingchannel.com/navrules>

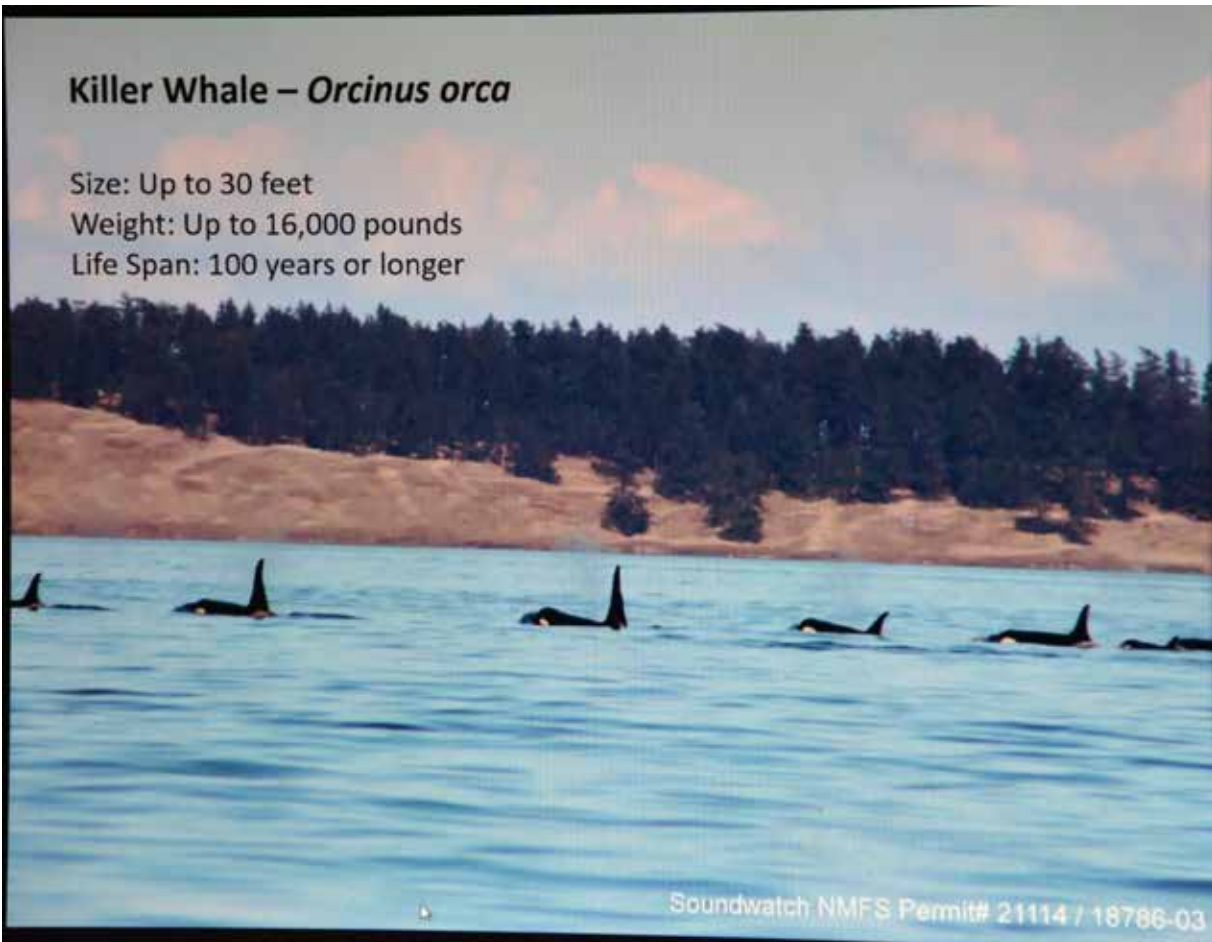


New regulations for operating vessels around killer whales, specifically the Southern Resident pod, in our area.

Below. There are many ways we can help be an Orca Steward.

Be an Orca Steward

- SAVE ELECTRICITY.** Unplug chargers when you aren't using them.
Turn the heat down in your bedroom at night and while you are at school.
- SAVE WATER.** Ask your parents to change the lightbulbs in your home to fluorescent ones.
Take shorter showers.
Instead of leaving the water running, turn it off while you are brushing your teeth, washing dishes or soaping up in the shower.
- REDUCE POLLUTION.** Remove garbage from a beach.
Ask your parents to purchase organically grown fruit or vegetables if possible. Organically grown means that pesticides aren't used.
Ask your parents to change one cleaning product in your home to a biodegradable one.
During the summer, pull weeds in your yard instead of using chemicals.

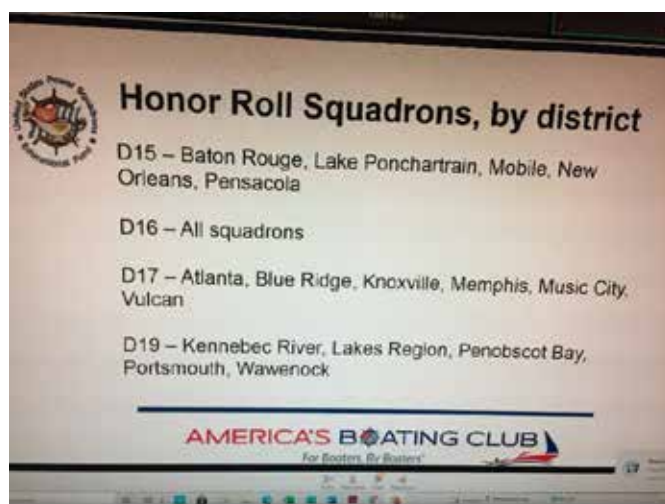
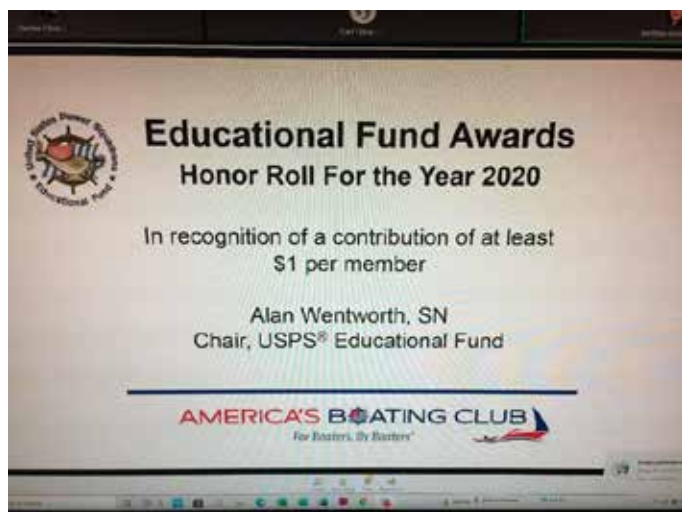

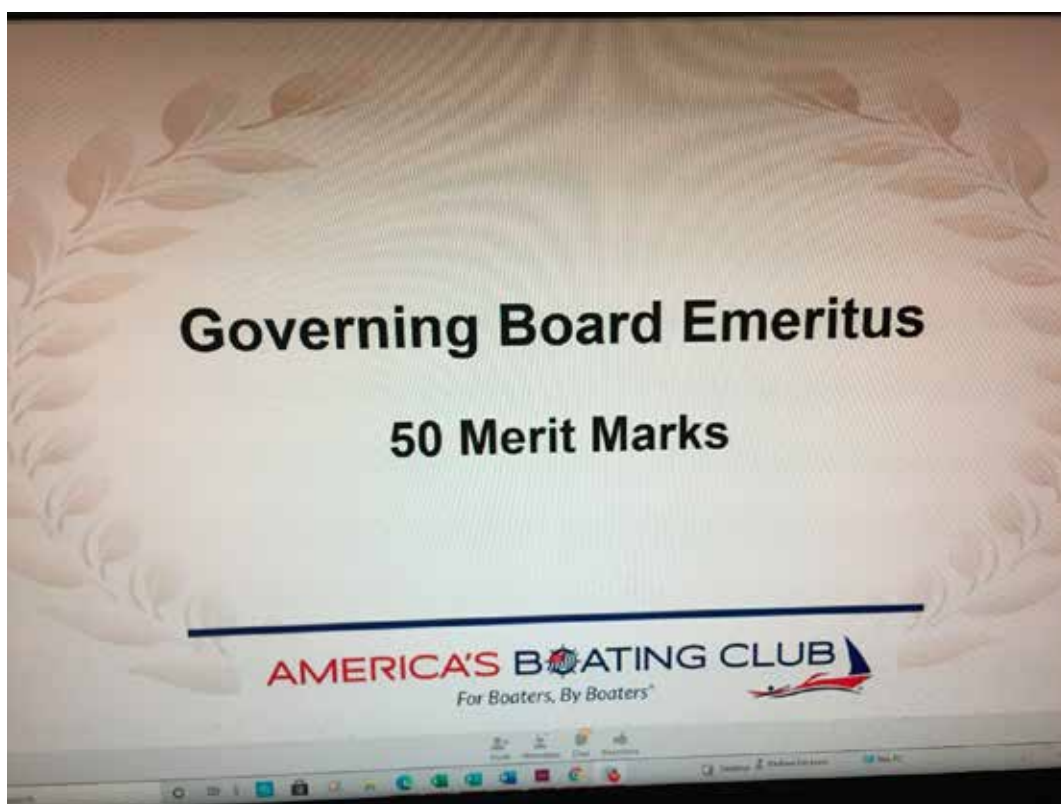

Governing Board Emeritus Award

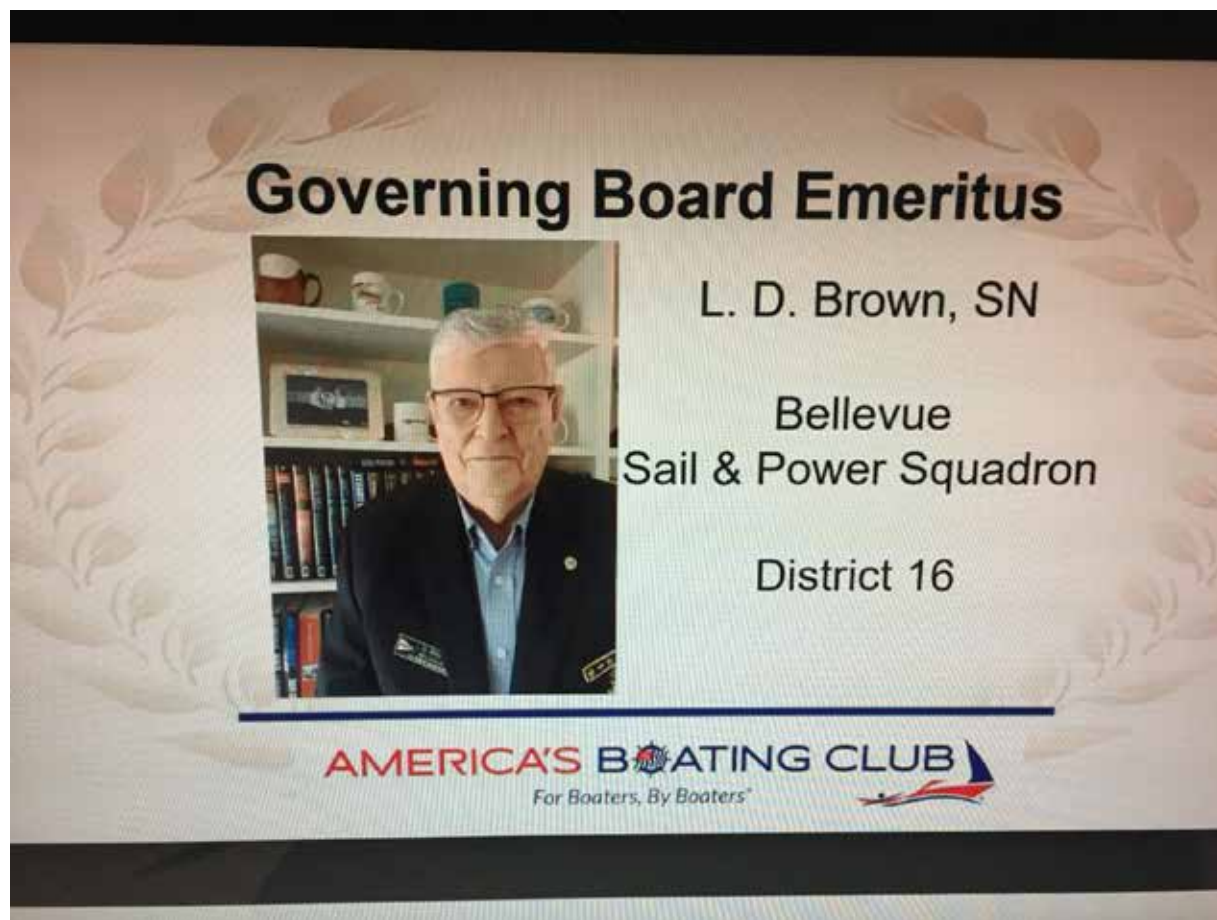

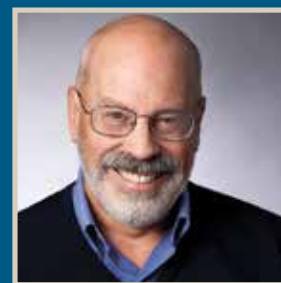
